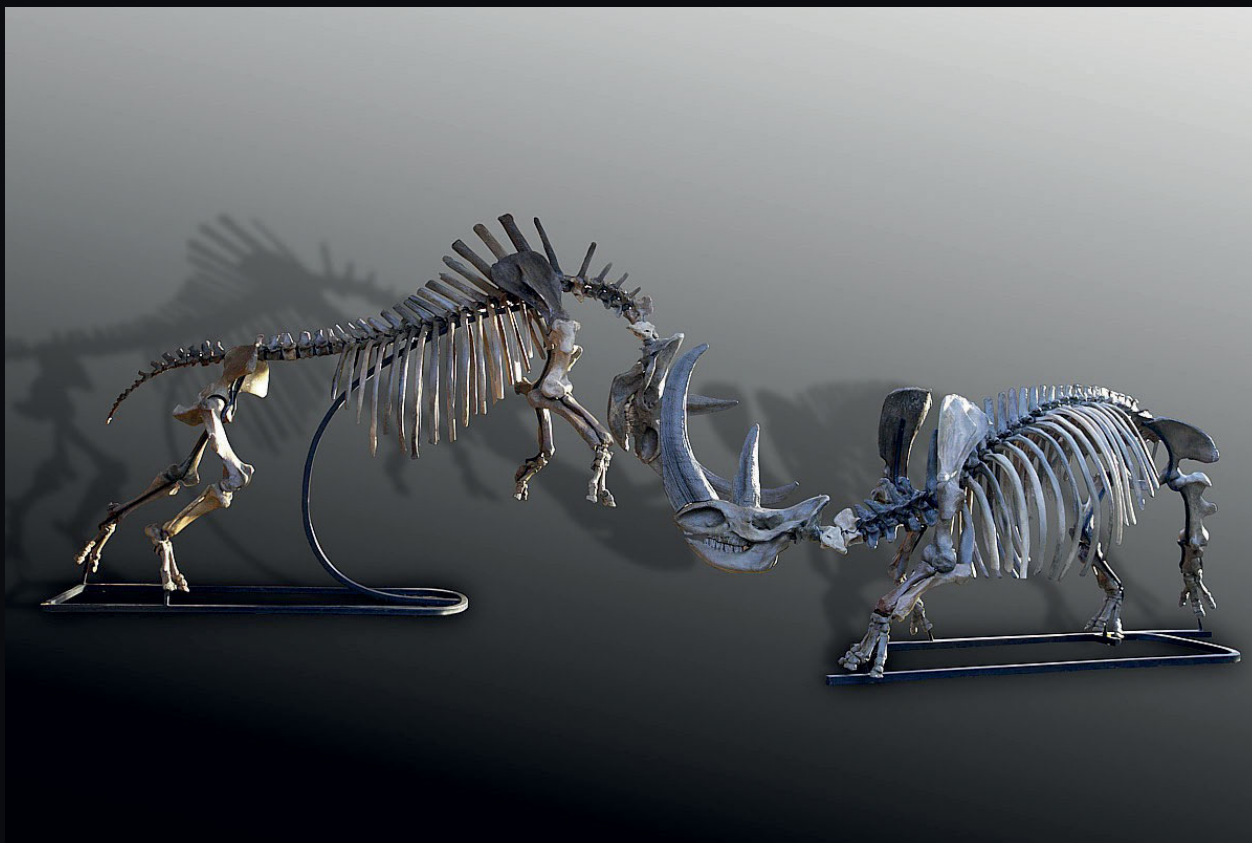

ABOUT THE SPECIES

Two horns, a metre of hair, and a skull built like a plough.

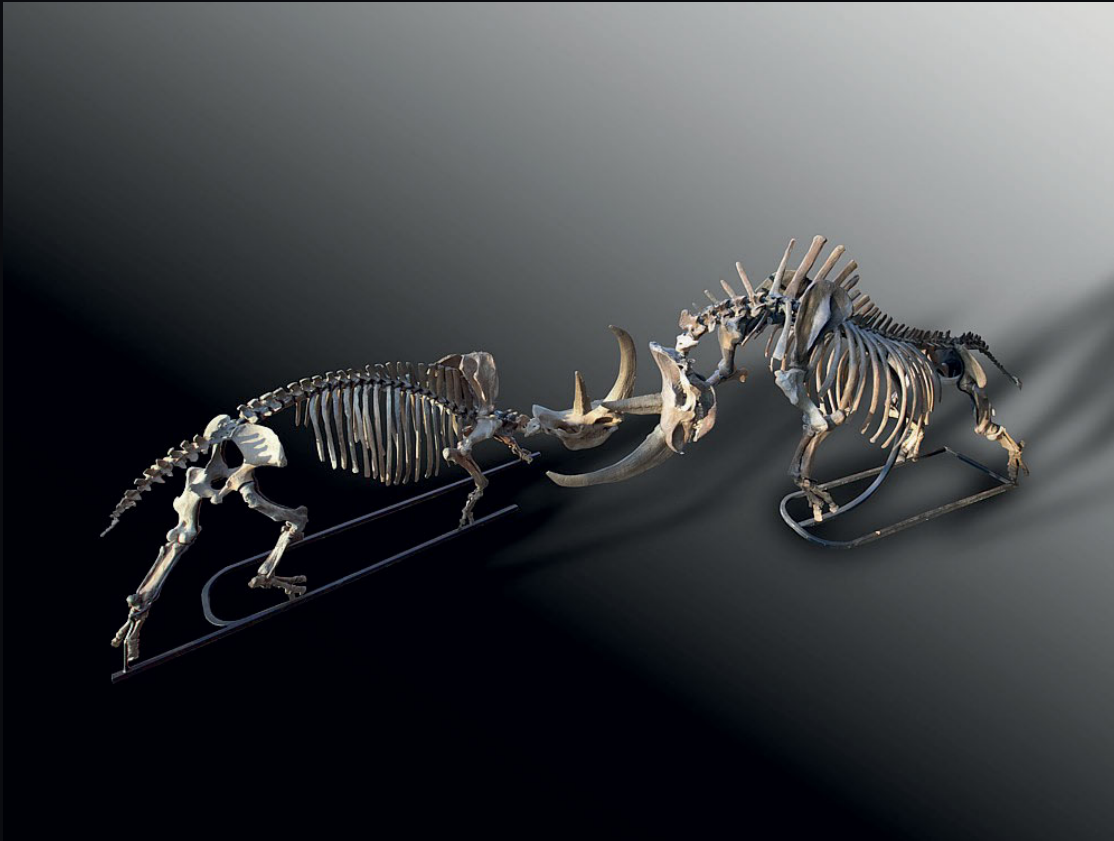
The front horn of a woolly rhino could exceed a metre and was worn flat on one side — from sweeping snow off the grass. The species lived across the mammoth steppe and was one of the last to go, surviving in Siberia until about 14 000 years ago. The Irtysch gravels in the Tyumen region are among the richest sources of its bones.

Legally excavated

Every specimen was recovered under permit in the Perm region and the Tyumen region of Russia and left the country with an export licence. Copies travel with the specimen.

Condition report

Each bone is listed: original, restored or replica. Replicas are used only where a part never fossilises — rhinoceros horns, for example — and are always declared.

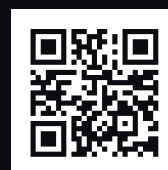
Delivery and installation
